Madison Manor History

Did You Know...?

Did you know that the first telephone in Arlington County was installed in what is now Madison Manor?

In the April 2015 newsletter we discussed Nicolas Febrey, an early owner of half the land that is now Madison Manor. Febrey's granddaughter Ella married Dr. Thomas M. Talbott in 1876. In 1885 they acquired the Febrey land on the west side of McKinley Road – roughly from the McKinley school south to Wilson Boulevard.



Besides being a physician, Dr. Talbott was a business and community leader in Falls Church, where he was one of the founders of the M. E. Church Telephone Company. While telephones were installed in Alexandria prior to that, the one installed in Dr. Talbott's house in 1888 was the first in what is now Arlington County. This phone made it possible to “call the doctor” when his services were needed.

After Ella's death Dr. Talbot and his second wife, Katherine (nee Nourse), built the second house in Madison Manor, in 1893. That house was torn down in about 1965 and replaced with the Christian Science church.

At Dr. Talbot's death in 1940, he was said to have delivered over 2,000 babies in his 68-year career. One can imagine many of the calls to that home telephone were for his assistance on those births.

The graves of Dr. Talbott and his two wives can be found in the nearby Oakwood Cemetery on Roosevelt Street in Falls Church.

Advice for Gardeners

Collecting Rain Water in the Earth, Not a Rain Barrel

You don't need rain barrels to collect rain water. They are useful if you want to store water and use it for irrigation but for stormwater management they are dwarfed by amount of rainfall that falls in the average storm. One inch of rain falling over a 1000 square-foot roof produces 600 gallons of water. A 50-gallon rain barrel only catches 1/12 of the water.

A 600 gallon water tank is not only large and obtrusive but also expensive. Not to worry, there are multiple ways to catch rain water without using a container at all. Below are examples of multiple ways we have collected rain water using the earth as the container.

You can catch it in a rain garden:



Here we piped the downspout to a bowl shaped depression which we later planted with Aronia, Low- Bush Blueberries and native perennial flowers. The soil in the center is deeply tilled and the water infiltrates rapidly while the plants benefit from the additional water.

You can catch it in a swale:

A swale is a depression in the earth much like the rain garden but linear in shape, therefore more adept at catching runoff. This client had runoff problems from their neighbor. We created a swale along the property line to catch and infiltrate the runoff before it entered their property. The Elderberries and Aronia benefit from the additional water.



Or, you can use perforated pipe to leach it into the soil:



This is a vegetable garden which we created on contour and directed the roof runoff into a perforated pipe and buried the pipe in gravel. All of the water from the roof infiltrates into the soil and waters the vegetable beds.



Here we used the same principal with the infiltration pipe but planted columnar apple trees on top of the pipe. Now the water from the pipes waters the apple trees.



Homeowners' Q&A

Minimizing Storm Damage

The good folks at Moss Building and Design, a family-owned building and design company in Chantilly, VA, have volunteered to answer, in each issue of this newsletter, a question they're often asked by their northern Virginia homeowner clients. Here's the first one.

Q. With storm season upon us, how can I best prepare my home to minimize any storm damage?

A. The first thing you might want to do is have a licensed contractor come and inspect your roof to check for possible leaks. After that, make sure your gutters and drains are clean so that rapidly falling rain doesn't get blocked and start flooding a certain area around your house. Additionally, make sure your downspouts are positioned away from your home's foundation. You could even consider getting removable extenders that can be attached to your downspouts to carry the rain even farther away from your foundation.

Another thing to take into consideration, storm-wise, is tree care. This includes removing dead and rotting trees and branches and also trimming back trees to keep them at their healthiest. Because we have some extremely old trees in Arlington, it wouldn't hurt to have an arborist come to check out the health of your trees, so you can be aware of any failing trees before they came crashing down around—or even onto--your house.


And last, but not least, prepare for the inevitable. If you don't have one already, a back-up generator might be a good investment. Not just to have power to keep your major appliances running (refrigerator, air conditioner), but also to keep that ever important sump pump running smoothly. Although some sump pumps are equipped to handle power failures with battery back-up, not all are designed to do so. If the power goes off, a back-up generator should keep that sump pump going and help minimize the risk of a flooded basement.

School News

McKinley Elementary School Construction Project FAQ's Dave Blair

Question: What are the major phases of the project and when will the project be completed?

Question: When will the construction occur during the day and what is the schedule?

- **On-Site Work Hours:** Normal business working hours 7:00 a.m. to 6:30 p.m., Monday through Friday.
- **Weekend and Holiday Hours:** 10:00 a.m. to 6:30 p.m.
- **Hours for Utility Shutdowns:** As permitted by the impacted homeowner(s)
- **Public right of way work:** Between 9:00 a.m. and 3:30 p.m. Monday through Friday. Between 10:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m. on weekends and holidays

Question: How is APS addressing construction worker parking?

Arlington Public Schools has leased 45 parking spaces at the First Church of Christ Scientist for the duration of the project. Workers will walk to the site and parking is prohibited on streets around the school.

Question: What work is currently underway or completed?

There has been a lot of work on the McKinley Elementary School construction site since school let out. To ensure the site is protected, erosion control measures have been put in place, as well as tree protection elements. Three single relocatables have been removed from the site per the plan. In addition, the “12 plex” relocatable

classrooms in the field are approximately 50% complete (meaning in place and hooked up for classes in September). Site work demolition is ongoing where much of the work related to the pentagon demolition is complete.

Question: When will the playground and field be accessible again for the community?

It is likely that the new field space would not be able to be used until closer to 2017 (Note: this is not a fact, but an educated guess). APS is hoping to have the new playground completed and accessible by Spring 2016.

Question: Whom do I contact if I have an issue or concern about the construction project?

Please do not hesitate to contact the Community Liaison, Robin Hodges, should you have any issues or concerns about the construction of the project. She will be serving as the liaison to the community throughout the construction of the site.

ArlingtonVA Mobile App Really Works!

Have you discovered ArlingtonVA? This free app lets you report problems and make service requests to the county directly from your Apple, Android, or Windows smartphone. See a pothole, fallen tree, broken streetlight, or median in need of mowing? Snap a photo with your phone and use this app to speed it to the county, where it will be instantly routed to the right division. You'll receive a tracking ID and be notified when the issue is resolved.

The app also lets you click on “nearby requests” to see if your issue has already been reported by others. Another link, “recycling lookup,” lets you quickly find out whether something can be recycled. Still others let you view county and police department news releases.

User experience so far has shown that this portal really does yield quick county action. Just search for it in your smartphone's apps store, download, and try it for yourself!

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
